One School program, Connectikids, 20. I have no idea how many people have viewed the videos, which are online. We will continue to publicize the videos, sell the anthologies, and send a copy of the anthology to Governor Ned Lamont and to the Commissioner of DEEP.

Briefly describe how you allocated your fellowship funds for your civic project(s): *.

Publication of Anthology: \$3,672 to Grayson Books and artist Jon Friedman for cover.

Readings (both zoom and live): \$7,100.

Workshop: \$1000.

Videography: David Bibbey: \$4,785.75; Green Poetry Café video (Donaghy) \$1000.

Total Expenditure: \$16,557.75.

Did you need to adapt/revise your proposed civic project? If so, how? *

I had planned to organize a series of Green Poetry Cafes, each of which would offer at least 2 "green" or environmentally focused readings, live. Because of the pandemic, I moved to filming poets out in the open on land preserves, supporting videos made by others and readings on zoom.

What community partnerships did you establish as part of your civic project? *. Greater awareness of environmental poetry at libraries and local reading venues. Greater presence at established workshop venues.

Additional notes about your civic project(s):

How has this fellowship changed your perception towards the role of poetry in your community?

Yes. The comment I have heard from other poets most frequently is their gratitude that as Poet Laureate I have used the position to build a poetry community, one that is cooperative rather than competitive, both supportive and interconnected. I have learned skills of program building and have learned to work with others more efficiently. Poetry can be a solitary enterprise; writing the poetry certainly is. But getting the poems to a wider audience requires cooperation and mutual trust among poets and citizens. I think that without the grant from the Academy of American Poets, I would have not been able to touch as many lives with poetry, to open as many hearts, to educate as many minds (of all ages). As a result of my experience, I plan to write to the Governor of Connecticut to create a program stipend for the Poet Laureate position in the future. Otherwise, the poet may be personally enriched, but not the communities of the state.

How has this fellowship impacted your creative life? Please share links to any books and/or poems published or forthcoming. *. Coming in August, 2021 my thirteenth book of poems, **THE GLASS GLOBE**. (catalog copy attached). Publication of **Waking Up to the Earth:**Connecticut Poets in a Time of Global Crisis which as editor I assembled and for which I wrote an introduction. Publication of "Listening to the Wood Thrush: Notes Toward the Greening of Poetry" in *The Georgia Review*, Fall, 202. An essay. Another book of poems nearly completed, working title: **OLD LOVE**.

I would like the Academy to know how profoundly grateful I am to its generosity and support. It's a gratitude that matches my love of trees and rivers and the capacity of the heart to open to others. Thank you.
